Woodwork Trip to the Power Tool Show

The magazine team were interested to know how our team of Woodwork Staff got on at the Power Tool Show at the Yorkshire Showground.

Richard: The show was very interesting as it was full of new ideas and different machines to look at. There was a saw that was £700 and chisels over £100 each but incredible quality. There were top of the line scroll saws and dust extraction systems. We need new ones of the latter for the machine shop.


There was a device that does the same job as a drill but has a sleeve instead of a driver to hold the screwhead. It was brilliant watching all the demos, especially the lathes. They did the most amazing stuff! A man even made a lampshade out of wood. It was very impressive how transparent he was able to make the wood.

We looked at Japanese building construction. They don't use any nails or screws but instead they build joints out of green timber that's unseasoned.

Apparently it's earthquake proof.








Baking Bonanza

Our Wednesday afternoon Baking Group have been mixing and whisking up lots of delicious treats this month! It looks like chocolate has been quite a big theme!










Cooks Corner

Cooks Corner is back and here to bring you delicious recipes made by Tuesday morning's group! This month's favourite recipe was 'The Hairy Bikers' Sweet and Sour Chicken!' Perfect for cold winter nights!

For the chicken

1/2 small pineapple
2 boneless, skinless chicken breasts
2 tbsp sunflower oil
1 onion, cut into wedges
1 red pepper, deseeded and chopped
1 green pepper, deseeded and chopped
1 tbsp cornflour
4 spring onions, trimmed and thinly sliced





For the sauce

1 tbsp cornflour
300ml fresh pineapple juice
2 garlic cloves, crushed
25g ginger, peeled and finely grated
1 tbsp dark soy sauce
2 tbsp white wine vinegar
2 tbsp soft light brown sugar
3 tbsp tomato ketchup
1 pinch dried chilli flakes

STEP 1

To make the sauce, put the cornflour in a small bowl and stir in two tablespoons of the pineapple juice until smooth. Put the remaining pineapple juice in a separate bowl and stir in the garlic, ginger, soy, vinegar, sugar, ketchup and chilli flakes until thoroughly combined. Set aside.

STEP 2

Put the pineapple on a board and cut off the skin. Quarter lengthways and remove the tough central core. Cut the pineapple into thick slices and set aside. Cut each chicken breast into pieces.

STEP 3

Heat the oil in a large non-stick frying pan or wok and stir-fry the onion and peppers for three minutes over a high heat. Coat the chicken in the cornflour and add to the pan. Stir-fry for four minutes until very lightly coloured on all sides.

STEP 4

Add the pineapple and sweet and sour sauce to the pan with the chicken and bring to a simmer over a medium heat. Cook for 4–5 minutes, stirring regularly until the chicken is cooked through and the pineapple is hot.

STEP 5

Stir in the cornflour and pineapple solution mixture and cook for 30–60 seconds until the sauce is thickened and glossy, turning the chicken and vegetables until nicely coated.

Sprinkle with sliced spring onions and serve hot.

Rainy Day Relaxation

One of our new courses has been **Team Building** run by Andrew and Pat.

They've worked together to create this great piece of writing.



We are Team-Building Group and together we've written a story about the little boy in the photograph and how he might lived.

We think his name is Henry and he lived in London a very long time ago in a big 5 storey house with a scary attic.



There was no electricity in those days so no electric lights, just candles and oil lamps. No electricity meant no mobile phones, no tablets and no television. Can you imagine that! What would you do with your time?

There were no cars so everyone had to walk everywhere or, if they could afford it, they might have had a donkey or a horse. Very wealthy people might have been able to afford a horse and carriage.

Because plastic hadn't been invented.

Henry would only have had a very few toys like marbles or small wooden toys his father might have made. He could have had a hoop and stick and a ball and maybe played hopskotch.

There was no central heating but there would be fireplaces in every room. In big houses there would be servants who would light the fires to warm the rooms before people got up. When the chimneys got blocked with soot you had to get a chimney sweep like in Mary Poppins and sometimes they made little boys climb up inside the chimney to knock the soot down.

The house didn't have a proper toilet and Henry would have had to go down the garden to use and earth toilet or bucket in a little shed. That must have been horrible especially in the winter when it was dark and raining and very cold.

There were no supermarkets so it wouldn't have been easy to buy food and there was no frozen food or fridges to keep food fresh. Everyone would grow as much fruit and vegetables as they could – potatoes, carrots, beans, tomatoes and apples and pears. Some people kept chickens so that they could have eggs. Sugar was very expensive so there were hardly any sweets. There would be markets every week where you could buy cheese, butter, perhaps bread and maybe some meat.

What would Christmas have been like? Henry would have got a few small presents in a stocking, maybe an orange, some sugared almonds and perhaps a homemade toy. Henry probably made paper chains to decorate the house with, along with lots of greenery and holly. No decorations were put up before Christmas Eve. Christmas was a special time and there was lovely food that people couldn't afford during the rest of the year like turkey or goose, Christmas Pudding, Mince Pies, Christmas cake and mulled wine.

Henry would have gone singing carols and late on Christmas Eve, all the family went to a special Christmas service in the church. If there was some snow, Henry would have had snowball fights and built a snowman. There would be a wreath hanging on the front door which Henry had helped his mum to make.




